Interesting Tips

I don't know if you all read the tips published in the Courier Mail on the 19th Jan, but I found them very helpful not only during the floods, but useful to know.

<u>Mould</u>: Bleach is not the solution. The problem with bleach is that all it does is bleach mould spores white so you can't see it, and it just keeps coming back.. To kill the mould spore, put a quarter of a teaspoon of oil of cloves and a litre of water into a spray bottle. Mist it over the areas where there is mould spore and leave it for 24 to 48 hours. It kills the spore. The quantity is really important. You only need a very small amount. It is a volatile oil and if it is too strong, it can damage anything that contains plastic.

Drying out books and papers: Get a large plastic container with a lid and half fill with kitty litter. Cover the kitty litter with a piece of plastic wrap and punch holes in the plastic so you have air flow. Lay out all your books and papers in there, put on the lid and leave for a week. You will find the moisture gone and no little brown patches.

<u>Leather shoes</u>: Don't put them out in the sun as they will end up stiff and curled. To get rid of mould spore from leather, put a quarter of a teaspoon of oil of cloves into a 250ml bottle of baby oil. Give the bottle a good shake and wipe two to three drops of the mixture over your leather. Then pack the shoes with newspaper and dry them in the shade – not the sun – so they dry slowly and should end up soft. You can use the same mixture for all your leather furniture.

<u>Smelly clothes</u>: It's important to remember that more soap doesn't make clothes cleaner. Soap is only there to break the surface tension of the water. So bring your soap powder down to a quarter of the quantity that's normally suggested and then add two tablespoons of bi-carb soda. Wash your clothes on normal cycle and put two tablespoons of white vinegar in the fabric conditioner slot. It cleans the clothes, gets the muck out of them, doesn't leave soap residue and they smell lovely.
