In the Beginning

In May 1977 the Clan Forsyth Society in Scotland was reconstituted and a Clan Chief inaugurated. The purpose of the Society was to restore recognition and dignity to the name of Forsyth.

Following a visit by the Clan Chief to Sydney in November 1978, some interested Australian Forsyths formed the Clan Forsyth Australia Society. This Society has continued to flourish. Following this success in Sydney it was decided to involve the Melbourne Forsyths, and a preliminary meeting was held at Bill Forsyth's home in Essendon on 8 June 1979. Some 30 interested people attended and elected a Steering Committee which was given the purpose of publicising the Clan Forsyth Australia Society (Melbourne region) with the aim of seeking more widespread support.

The day set aside for the forming of the Clan Forsyth Society (Queensland) was Sunday, 16 March, 1980 and some fifty members of Forsyth families gathered together to attend a Church Service at Knox Uniting Church, Moorooka. Some members took part in the Service, which was followed by lunch, and a meeting at which election of officers took place and a Constitution adopted.

The Steering Committee which had arranged the function retired, but offered themselves for nomination.

The first Ipswich gathering since the formation of the Official Clan Association was held on 7 September 1980. It was at the previous gathering 12 months prior, at Ipswich that the initial movement began which has resulted in the formation of the Clan Association. It was decided then to have the Forsyth Gathering back at Peak Crossing.

The existence of this Clan Society owes very much to the Reunions of the Forsyths from Peak Crossing, which have been taking place in August of each year since 1974. It is absolutely vital that these reunions continue. The bulk of the Forsyths in Queensland have descended from the six Forsyth brothers who settled at Peak Crossing more than 140 years ago. One of the main purposes of the Clan Society is to enable these "Descendants" to discover their heritage and keep in contact with their relatives.

The Clan Society is not limited just to this one 'Tree'. Meeting Forsyths who are not related in any way is a rewarding experience.

Peak Mountain View Park

Peak Mountain View Park Memorial Shelter and BBQ were erected prior to March 1981 in memory of the 6 Forsyth Brothers who settled in the area in the 1800's.

The money to erect these 2 structures was collected as donations from the members of the Society.

After the building of the shelter and BBQ, \$105.59 was surplus and placed in a bank account to reap the benefits of interest until another project was adopted.

At a Committee meeting in February 1983 and then at the Reunion, it was suggested that some funds which had been collected be put to seating arrangement, of log construction, be erected around the existing Memorial Shelter and BBQ. Timber was offered by Gordon Perry and Don Forsyth – to come from Forsyth Property.

Gordon Perry approached the Council for permission, which was granted and the seating erected.

By November 1983, led by Don Forsyth a Committee Member, some impressive split-log seats were constructed around the barbeque and picnic area previously installed.

Don and his brother Les, helped by Gwen & Ivan Gartshore, Ian Forsyth, Joy Farrell, Daphne Forsyth and Keith & Peg Forsyth put the split logs in place and stained them ready for the picnic in August.

At the picnic Ann MacNish (nee Forsyth), unveiled a plaque dedicating the whole area to the memory of the Forsyth Pioneers of the district. Three trees were then planted, one by Les Forsyth from Sydney, the incoming Clan Commissioner in Australia. The other two trees were planted by the oldest members present, Mrs. Anne Burrow (nee McIvor) (1893-1987) and Cyril Forsyth (1898-1984). The trees were donated by John and Fay Forsyth. John, the nephew of Les Forsyth who was the founding Vice-President of our Society.

Present Day

As you have just read, one of the aims of our Branch here in Queensland, from the beginning, was to retain our presence in the Peak Crossing and Harrisville District by donating or providing some facilities for public use as well as for our Clan.

In recent years the Committee and other members have put a lot of effort into fund raising to the point where we have a reasonable bank balance. The current Committee is considering any worthy projects where the Clan can work with the local area authorities and groups to improve public facilities.

Our first project, which is currently in progress, is to provide a Drinking Water Fountain in the park at Peak Crossing which gets a lot of use from local residents and their children being directly opposite the Primary School where a lot of our ancestors attended in the last 100 years. We also hold our annual picnic and AGM at the park.

We have had the Fountain manufactured from marine grade stainless steel to our specifications with a quality Water Bubbler Cock for a total cost of \$665. The Scenic Rim Council Works Manager has agreed to do the installation which should happen in the next month or so.





The other projects that we are considering and discussing with the Local Authorities and Groups are:

- 1. The replacement of our old picnic shelter at the park with a larger shelter. The Scenic Rim Council has allocated money for the replacement of a shelter this year but if we contribute then we will have a say in the size, position and time frame for the shelter.
- Assistance with the provision of a toilet facility at the Harrisville Cemetery. This is an historic
 cemetery where a lot of our ancestors are buried. It is managed by a Trust and supported by the
 Harrisville Lions Club. It is being well maintained by the Trust but has no toilet facilities for
 mourners, visitors or workers.

All members are invited to make suggestions for projects to be reviewed by the Committee.

Don has had interests in Army, having done his National Service when he was Eighteen, he continued to be in the C.M.F. in a number of roles, including Guns, Tanks, First Aid, and instructing for another 18 Years. After he left the Army he went into Scouting as a Senior Scout Leader, Venturer Leader, and Area Training Commissioner where he worked and instructed with young people from 14 - 18

years, and in later years instructed First Aid to Adult leaders.

Don worked in the Queensland Railway, for 46 Years and for 45 of those years he instructed in First Aid, after he retired in 1966 he still volunteered with the Railway First Aid Corp instructing First Aid.

In order to be Somebody, it is better to be liked by Nobody than to be liked by Everybody.


