Traditional Scottish Recipes - Corned Beef Soufflé

Combining corned beef and eggs creates a nourishing, low-cost dish. The quantities below are sufficient for two people

Ingredients:

6oz/175g lean corned beef Small can of tomatoes, drained

1 large onion, sliced 2 eggs, beaten

2 tablespoons tomato juice Pinch of mixed herbs

Method:

Slice the corned beef and layer onions and tomatoes, sprinkled with tomato juice and herbs as you go. End with tomatoes. Pour the beaten eggs over the top and bake in a moderate oven for 20 minutes. Serve with a salad.

A Bit of History – Did you ever wonder where the *Griffi*n came from?



FORSYTH – THE MEN OF THE GRIFFIN RACE

The symbol of Forsite, Forsate, Forsath, Forsyth, as it is variably spelled, was the griffin, a fabulous creature, winged, with a head of an eagle and the body of a lion. The symbol of the griffin denotes vigilance and strength. The race whose badge was the griffin controlled the areas later known as Friesland and Denmark.

In Scottish history, one of the royal races that came from Scandinavia into Scotland bore the griffin as its symbol.

Between 1246 and 1250 Osbert de Forsyth's relatives in the female line, who had held the castle and the Fonsac estates in the South of France for several generations, had divided the estates so that Osbert inherited very little. This led Osbert to leave France and go to Scotland, sailing from Bordeaux. They landed at Dover, and after a short stay in England, Osbert then crossed over to Armondale in Scotland. Osbert bore the shield with the emblems of Fronsac and Angoulene beneath the demi-griffin crest of the Forsyths. In Scotland Osbert had a son whose name was Wilhelm, who is recognised in the Chronicles of Scotland history as a feudal lord of Country Peebles. The first documented presence of the Forsyth name in Scotland was the signing of the 'Ragman Roll' in Berwick on 28th August 1296 by a William de Fersith. This was the document by which all the nobles, in Scotland were compelled to subscribe allegiance to Edward 1 of England after the failure of King John to defeat the English.
